Planning for the attack on Pearl Harbor had begun in very early 1941, by Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto. He finally won assent from the Naval High Command by, among other things, threatening to resign. The attack was approved in the summer at an Imperial Conference and again at a second Conference in the fall.

The majority of people killed at Pearl Harbor died when the Japanese bombers sank the Arizona, which the official Visitors Bureau says was one of the "first to fall." The Oklahoma also sank.
